HUMAN TRAFFICKING: Law Enforcement Response & Investigations

CNOA and HIDTA are jointly hosting Human Trafficking: Human Trafficking often referred to as Modern Day Slavery, impacts as many as 27 million people worldwide. In 2000 the United States government adopted an aggressive stance against trafficking by enacting criminal statutes, and offering assistance to trafficking victims. Since 2000 over half of the 50 states, including California, have passed laws defining human trafficking, created criminal statutes, and programs for victims. California law states all law enforcement officers will receive training on human trafficking. Human Trafficking and associated crimes have become a very real concern to law enforcement in the United States and across the world. Not only does this crime prey on the victims, it has crossed into other serious criminal acts including drug trafficking.

This course will offer students a background to trafficking, from a global to local perspective; the class will focus on the magnitude of the crime; provide investigators valuable information on how to recognize signs of Human Trafficking while conducting other investigations, and what to do if Human Trafficking is suspected.

Upon completion of the course, attendees will be competent in recognizing potential trafficking victims, understand the psychological aspects of victimization, and how to move through the investigative process to seek prosecution at both the local and Federal levels. Attendees will also be knowledgeable regarding options for victim services and continued presence in the United States.

Instructors: Sergeant John Vanek and Officer Jennifer Dotzler, both the San Jose Police Department Human Trafficking Task Force

The San Jose Police Human Trafficking Task Force is funded by the U.S. Department of Justice / Bureau of Justice Assistance. With a Focus on the identification and rescue of trafficking victims, training law enforcement and other potential first responders, and raising public awareness. Task Force members include the South Bay Coalition to End Human Trafficking (our victim-services provider), U.S. Attorney's Office, FBI, ICE, Santa Clara District Attorney's Office, and other law enforcement agencies. The San Jose Police Department Human Trafficking Task Force and The South Bay Coalition to End Human Trafficking (SJPDHITF & SBCEHT) work together to uphold a victim-centered approach to combat human trafficking and coordinate resources and strengthen local capacity to respond to trafficking victims and their needs.
